About the program

The CRCL <u>Coastal Leadership Institute</u> (CLI) is a professional training and education program that is comprised of monthly meetings in locations across the state. They will focus on subjects ranging from the ecology of Louisiana's coast to the cultures and industries that are imperiled by land loss. Participants will also learn about the legislative process, the Coastal Protection and Restoration Authority and the state's Coastal Master Plan.

The skills and knowledge you'll gain and the relationships you'll build will empower you to become a leader in the movement to protect and restore Louisiana's coast, where about 2,000 square miles of wetlands have vanished in less than a century.

CLI strives to educate and train residents from diverse backgrounds who are committed to restoring and protecting Louisiana's coast. While the program targets midcareer professionals, anyone can apply.

Applications are open now. The 2024-25 schedule kicks off Sept. 13 with an orientation and opening social in New Orleans.

The cost to participate in the program is \$1,000. Scholarships are available.

How it works

Enroll in a cohort

You'll join up with 20 to 25 fellow coastal leaders from across Louisiana. Unsure whether you should apply? We welcome your unique background, perspective and experience. Your peers will be from a diverse range of industries and career levels.

Attend monthly sessions

Once a month, you'll spend a day learning from ecological, cultural, economic and political experts. Each day includes a visit to sites and communities impacted by land loss or involved in coastal restoration.

Flex your skills

Leverage the tools and knowledge you've acquired to write op-eds, deliver public comments and build connections that effect positive change for Louisiana's coast.

Nominees represent a range of ages, from the undergraduate level to mid-career or retired, and work in a variety of industries, such as energy, tech, healthcare, renewable energy, nonprofit, media, politics, education, faith-based, legal and others.

What does it cost? The Coastal Leadership Institute costs \$1,000 per term. This does not include travel or other expenses. A limited number of scholarships will be available.

What if I can't attend a meeting? Participants can miss up to two classes and still complete the program.

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CRCL introduces new coastal leadership program for Louisiana residents

Application period for CLI's first cohort has opened; meetings will be held monthly

The Coalition to Restore Coastal Louisiana has introduced a coastal leadership and education program intended to empower residents to become more effective advocates for coastal restoration. The Coastal Leadership Institute was developed in response to demand from CRCL supporters who wanted to get more involved after taking part in volunteer events and other activities. The application period for the first cohort has opened, and the first class will be in September.

CLI, which will feature monthly meetings held in locations across the state, will focus on subjects ranging from the ecology of our coast to the cultures and industries that are imperiled by land loss. Participants will also learn about the legislative process, the Coastal Protection and Restoration Authority and the state's Coastal Master Plan. "Addressing Louisiana's coastal crisis will take efforts from industry, communities, government and concerned residents from across the state," said Ethan Melancon, advocacy director at the Coalition to Restore Coastal Louisiana. "That is why CRCL is excited to announce the launch of the Coastal Leadership Institute, a professional development program to equip Louisiana residents with the expertise and skills to advocate for and understand the coast's ecological relationship with culture, the economy and our politics."

Since its founding in 1988, CRCL has been a prominent advocate for science-based policy to restore and protect the state's coast, where about 2,000 square miles of wetlands have vanished in less than a century. Through its Oyster Shell Recycling Program, CRCL has recycled more than 14 million pounds of shell, keeping the resource out of landfills and using it instead to build reefs that create habitat for new oysters and that slow the rate of land loss; in September, the organization is building its sixth oyster reef, this one at Grand Bayou Indian Village in Plaquemines Parish.

The organization has planted more than 1 million trees and plants across Louisiana's coast through its Native Plants Program. CRCL also hosts the biennial State of the Coast conference, the premiere gathering on coastal restoration in the state, holds talks as part of its CRCLectures series and honors coastal leaders through its annual Coastal Stewardship Awards.
